

EARTH DAY MEMORIES: On April 22, 1970, I was marching down the center of State High-



way 32 in Wabeno, Wisconsin on the 1<sup>st</sup> Earth Day. For many successive years I've been involved in Earth Day activities in various states and organizations, especially the Forestville United Methodist Church.

Joan and I attended the first UMC Jubilee in Arcata in the 1990s and came home to create the Earth keepers group that held classes, fairs, Worship Services, and many other activities at this Church and other Churches, and including a workshop at the next Jubilee, held at Sonoma State. We hope all of you will take some time this month to reflect on God's call to all of us to care for His creation.

A significant shortage of Native American pastors and trained professionals exists and hopefully with this scholarship program those numbers will increase. Your offering allows the UMC to partner with existing native ministries to develop new programs on behalf of Native Americans.; including mentoring programs, peer support systems, funding for economic development projects, and restoring traditional and historic ways that bring forth new leaders for Native American communities.
